The Rho Chi Society Report of the National President 96th Annual Meeting

March 2020

It is my pleasure to provide you with this summary of the Society's activities and accomplishments since the 2019 annual meeting in Seattle, Washington.

At the close of calendar 2019, we successfully completed the launch of our national office in its new home at the University of Michigan. The leadership torch was passed from Interim Executive Vice President A. Wayne Pittman and long-time Society administrator Gail Moriarty. The Society flourished under their leadership and we are grateful for their guidance through the transition. Our new staff, Executive Vice President Karen Farris and Program Manager Cindy Diakow, led us through the first full year of activity under our Strategic Plan, revised in 2018, that will take us through 2023.

For records of the work of the Executive Council, I refer you to the archived approved minutes, accessible on the Society's Web site. The Audit Report submitted by Audit Committee Chair Paul A. Jungnickel and the Financial Summary provided by the National Office indicate that the Society is in good financial health. These reports are also accessible in the business materials on the Society's Web site.

In addition to the Society's standing committees, whose charges are outlined in our bylaws, four task forces were appointed and charged with efforts directly tied to the strategic plan.

- Former Rho Chi National President Jack Reynolds (Dean, Northeastern University) led a Mission Critical Task Force charged to recommend revised criteria for initial membership in the Society consistent with emerging definitions of intellectual excellence; a revised application process to reflect updated member eligibility determinations; and criteria, if appropriate, for sustained membership in the Society beyond initial induction. The task force completed this challenging task and its recommendations will be considered by the Executive Council. Proposed changes with implications for our bylaws will be presented to the delegates for a vote in 2021.
- President-Elect Emmanuelle Schwartzman led a task force that developed clearer expectations for chapter annual reports and created the rubric that is now used by Regional Councilors to more effectively evaluate those reports. This work was intended to stimulate chapter activities that more directly advance the mission and vision of the Society.
- Secretary Andy Smith led a Communications Task Force that has recommended strategies to foster communication and collaboration among chapters; more effectively use the Alumni Honor Roll distinction; increase the visibility of Rho Chi members' professional achievements; and actively engage members who serve as faculty and preceptors at schools and colleges of pharmacy. Throughout the coming year, you will notice improvements to the Society's Web site, including changes to its structure, content, and accessibility, that were recommended by the task force.

 Looking forward to the Society's centennial in 2022, Rho Chi Historian Cynthia Phillips led the Centennial Planning Task Force, which is developing a portfolio of events to commemorate the Society's first 100 years and look forward to the Society's next 100 years. A year-long series of events will launch in 2021 and run through 2022.

My two-year term as national president comes to a close under unusual health, social, and economic circumstances. It is at times such as this that we are reminded of the critical roles pharmacists and pharmaceutical scientists have -- in the care of patients and communities; in the response to national and global health emergencies, in meeting longer-term health needs; and in the discovery of new knowledge, tools, and processes to protect and improve health. The Rho Chi Society's commitment to the pursuit of intellectual excellence and critical inquiry to advance the profession has withstood the test of time and remains as important today as it was at our founding in 1922. I am enthusiastic about the work underway to assure that the Society continues to recognize intellectual achievement and stimulate critical inquiry in ways that are meaningful in the contemporary pharmacy education environment.

EVP Report 2020 National Convention March 17, 2020

This report is divided into five sections.

1. Context

Early 2020 is an interesting time in our lives as the coronavirus has caused us to practice 'social distancing' and to work from home, and all of our universities are teaching online to complete the semester. We are working as a society to stem the spread of the virus to reduce its health impact, yet we can already see the economic impact as our restaurants, schools, sports, and social events are all canceled. In early March, The American Pharmacists Association (APhA) canceled their annual meeting, causing our National Convention to move to an online format. For the first time, business meeting items will be posted on **rhochi.org** and delegates will vote online.

2. Moving the Rho Chi Society National Office

The University of Michigan College of Pharmacy, where I am a Professor, is pleased to host The Rho Chi Society National Office. I took the oath of office at the 2019 Rho Chi Society National Convention/annual meeting, and we set about to execute a contract between the University of Michigan and The Rho Chi Society. The contract was finalized July 23, 2019, and Cindy Diakow joined the National Office on July 29, 2019. We began to move the National Office from Chapel Hill, NC to Ann Arbor, MI in August, and all chapter support, financial transfers and inventory were moved to the Ann Arbor office effective December 20, 2019.

3. 2019-2020 Priorities

Our priorities in the National Office have been:

- Move day-to-day operations of the National Office to Ann Arbor, Michigan
- Support the work of the standing committees as well as Task Forces established by President Meyer
- Implement recommendations from the Communications Task Force to hire a new web
 designer to implement greater online functionality including member payments,
 submission of yearly reports, and purchasing of Rho Chi products
- Initiate and grow our social media presence to engage Rho Chi members, including alumni so that they can mentor and support our active chapter members
- File articles of incorporation in Michigan and hire an attorney to work with us to change our tax status from 501c7 to 501c3
- Develop and execute a cycle of quarterly meetings of the Executive Council and monthly meetings of the National Office and President



4. Updates on Budget

The financial viability of The Rho Chi Society is positive, and the audit report attests to this status, but it also raises significant concerns. In 2019, the operating expenses were \$328,002.29 and income was \$234,902.69, resulting in a deficit of \$93,099.60. Part of the deficit was due to the maintenance of two National Offices as well as increasing National Convention expenses. We also had deficit in 2018, arising for similar reasons. While we have \$620,684.37 cash on hand, we must take action to ensure the financial viability of the organization.

We must take immediate steps to increase revenue and decrease expenses. I am recommending an increase in the life-time membership fee from \$65 to \$100 to begin Fall 2020. This recommendation will be voted on at the March 21, 2020 Executive Council meeting, per guidance in By-law Article III, Section 9. Notably, life-time membership fees have not increased since 2007.

In addition to a fee increase, the National Office is working to generate revenue from Rho Chi promotional products, particularly those related to the Centennial celebration. We are also working to reduce expenses by lowering product inventory, reducing postage/handling via online purchasing of Rho Chi insignia, and lowering National Convention/annual meeting costs.


Finally, the change in our tax status to 501c3 provides opportunity for us to grow our financial investments to support our Centennial celebrations as well as grow our scholarship and award programs. Sponsorships and donations are expected to allow us to fund our Centennial celebrations with minor impact on our current expenses.


5. The Rho Chi Honor Society 100th Celebration 2021-2022

RE: Report of Audit of 2019 Rho Chi Financial Records

Dear Dr. Meyer:

The Rho Chi Audit Committee consisting of Gary DeLander, Susan Skledar, and Paul Jungnickel (Chair) was charged to review the Society's 2019 Financial Records. Cindy Diakow, Program Manager, provided the Society's Financial Records to the Committee's members.

The Society's financial records were complicated somewhat by the transfer of funds associated with the relocation of the National Office from the University of North Carolina to the University of Michigan. These changes included closing the Wells Fargo Checking Account, liquidating a money market account, and liquidating 3 certificates of deposit. Money from all aforementioned accounts was transferred to a new checking account at the Bank of Ann Arbor.

The Committee finds all financial records to be in good order, with only minor discrepancies that need to be addressed:

- On page 2 of the 2019 Treasurer's Report, the year 2017 needs to be corrected to the correct year of 2019.
- On August 27, 2019, the balance (\$118,213.19) in the Wells Fargo Money Market Account was transferred to the Bank of Ann Arbor. The amount shown in the Quicken entry is \$118,146.17 which was the ending balance of this account on December 31, 2018.
- For November 29, 2019 the Wells Fargo account shows an interest payment of \$1.11, while the entry in Quicken shows an amount of \$1.00 for this transaction.
- For December 31, 2019 the Wells Fargo account shows an interest payment of \$1.89 and a \$2.00 monthly check return/image fee. Neither of these transactions were found in the Quicken records provided to the Committee.

While not directly related to the Committee's auditing function, the Committee did notice that 2019 was the second consecutive year where the Society's operating expenses significantly exceeded the revenue received. Relevant financial issues are as follows:

- The operations deficits were \$93,009.60 for 2019 and \$47,762.59 for 2018.
- Total expenses were \$328,002.79 for 2019 and \$271,267,84 for 2018.
- Net equity at the end of 2019 was \$620,684.37 compared with \$\$715,309.36 at the end of 2018.

The Committee realizes that the Society has had significant additional expenses during the past two years related to multiple relocations of the National Office. Of particular note is that the amount spent on staff salaries in 2019 was about \$70,000 more than for 2018; this is explained by the simultaneous maintenance of two offices. The Committee also noted the \$5,000 gift to the Wincor Family Endowment in memory of former Executive Vice President Michael Wincor, which is not a typical expense. While

these are logical explanations, the Committee does consider consecutive years with significant deficits to be a concerning trend that the Executive Council needs to address with additional revenue or reduced expenses.

Given the extraordinary times we are living in, other more important priorities prevented Gary DeLander from reviewing the Society's Financial Records at this time. I am submitting this audit report on behalf of the Committee, even though it reflects the review of records by only Susan Skledar and myself. I am requesting the National Office to allow Gary DeLander to review the Society's Records at later time and to submit any additional comments that he may deem to be appropriate.

On behalf of the Committee's members, thank you for the opportunity to serve Rho Chi in this capacity.
