The Rho Chi Society Report of the National President March 2022

It is my pleasure to provide you with a summary of the Society's activities and accomplishments since the virtual 2021 National Convention.

Of note, some of the accomplishments of the Society include the following:

- We welcomed 8 new council members to our executive council
- In addition to the Society's standing committees, whose charges are outlined in our bylaws, four task forces were appointed and charged with efforts directly tied to the strategic plan:
 - o The awards task force, chaired by Lucio Volino, has been hard at work refining the criteria for the various chapter awards. Some of the changes include the following:
 - The evaluation rubrics for awards were further updated to ensure the selection process is reflective of chapter activities.
 - There will be three phases to the chapter of the year award selection. Round 1 will review all reports and select 2 finalists from each region. The top 20 will advance to the next round. Round 2 will select out the top 10 from round 1 finalists, and Round 3 will select a winner from the top 10 reports.
 - In preparation for the review process, councilors review and complete a mock grading report to standardize and ensure consistency in report grading.
 - The award committee developed a training presentation for councilors on award grading/review and expectations.
 - The Centennial Task Force, chaired by Karen Farris has been finalizing the details for our centennial events. These include:
 - Centennial giveaway items are available for order from our website; many chapters have requested items for their chapter to commemorate the centennial celebration.
 - Centennial donation packages are available for members who would like to give back to the society. We encourage all members- past and present, to consider donating to the society. Your donation will help the next generation of rho chi members through annual awards and the ability to expand our award profile for students and chapters.
 - There will be updated announcements coming soon with details about our centennial celebration to be held at APhA Annual Meeting this upcoming March and for virtual events.
 - The centennial task force is working with the founding chapters to help gather historical information about the society and to commemorate our 100 years.
 - Our Communication Task Force Chaired by Amanda Stahnke is working on updating and maintaining our website. This includes increasing our social media presence. We encourage all members to visit Rhochi.org to find out how you can be linked in through our various social media platforms. Finally, the task force is working on proposing language for a bylaw change to covert the task force into a standing committee.

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- The Town Hall Task Force Chaired by me, has had an opportunity to reflect on the success of our first Town Hall event this past April, and is busy planning for new events. This past April, Rho Chi held its first Inaugural Virtual Town Hall, with roughly 130 participants registered for the event. The event focused on professional development topics, with a special session for advisors led by Karen Farris. We had a number of Rho Chi Advisors and other Rho Chi Alumni provide their expertise as topic moderators. The event received positive feedback from attendees.
- There is another town hall planned for April 2022 with a focused session for chapter executive board members and their advisors. This session will feature previous chapter award winners.
- Updates from the national office include the following:
 - From the National Treasurer, Brad Boucher:
 - Brad Boucher, our National Treasurer, has secured an external financial advisor to help the Rho Chi Society diversify investments and make long-term financial plans for growth.
 - An investment policy was unanimously approved by the executive council this
 past summer and our national bylaws were updated in May 2021.
 - o Updates from our Executive Vice President, Karen Farris includes:
 - 501c(3) chapter conversion update
 - 32 chapters are covered under their university
 - Other chapters in process/working with Cindy
 - Website continues to be updated. In addition, The National office has reached out to Alumni through our chapters and social media to increase connectivity with Rho Chi Alumni. Members can update their profiles online and mark, if interested, in becoming speakers and mentors. (https://rhochi.org/resources/memberlookup.php)
 - Developing training for new Regional Councilors on Rho Chi Executive Council to familiarize them with expected responsibilities
 - The Audit Committee, chaired by Paul Jungnickel, submitted their annual report and it was accepted by the Executive Committee at our last meeting.
 - The Lecture Award Committee, chaired by Cynthia Phillips, selected Dr. Jean Nappi as the 2022 recipient of this prestigious award. Dr. Nappi's presentation can be found on our website.

For records of all the work of the Executive Council, I refer you to the archived approved minutes, accessible on the Society's website, rhochi.org.

In addition, I am pleased to announce Rho Chi will be showcasing our 100-year history and past leadership! More details can be found on the Society's webpage.

I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to all the chapters, rho chi members- new and seasoned, Faculty Advisors, Regional Councilors, Executive Council Members including Immediate Past President Susan Meyer, President-Elect Lucio Volino, Treasurer Brad Boucher, Program Manager Cindy Diakow, and Executive Vice President Karen Farris for all their hard work especially during these unique and trying times. Without everyone working towards the mission and vision of this amazing organization we would not be here at 100 years since its inception and thriving.

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As I come to the end of my presidency, I am able to reflect on all we as an organization and as a profession have gone through these past 2 years. It is inspiring to see how much growth, adaptability and innovation there have been by our members and chapters. I am deeply honored to be a member of this society and to witness it herald in its 100 year anniversary this year. RE: Report of Audit of 2021 Rho Chi Financial Records

Dear Dr. Schwartzman:

The Rho Chi Audit Committee consisting of Susan Skledar, John Bentley, and Paul Jungnickel (Chair) was charged to review the Society's 2021 Financial Records. Cindy Diakow, Program Manager, provided the Society's Financial Records to the Committee's members.

The Committee finds all financial records to be in good order and noted only the following discrepancies on the Treasurer's Report.

- From the statements provided, the end of year market value of the Midwest Trust Short Term Investment Account is \$49,901.72 instead of \$49,825.80 as indicated on the Treasurer's Report.
- From the statements provided, the end of year market value of the Midwest Trust Long Term Investment Account is \$511,090.61 instead of \$510,880.53 as indicated on the Treasurer's Report.

The Committee recommends for subsequent years that the Treasurer's Report include the account values at the beginning and end of each year so that the gains/losses on investments are reported.

The Committee notes that revenue in the amount of \$6,788.86 was received in late December 2021 but not deposited in the checking account until January 2022. The breakdown of this revenue is:

• Chapter dues: \$3,542.00

• Contributions to the Centennial Fund \$2,076.64

• Miscellaneous other revenue: \$1,170.22

While not directly related to the Committee's auditing function, the Committee does note the Society's improved financial status. Operating revenue in 2021 revenue exceeded expenses by \$129,790.52. Of particular significance were \$36,143 in revenue from royalties for Rho Chi Merchandise sold by external vendors and \$10,105.25 in contributions to the Centennial Campaign (with \$2,076.24 donated in 2021 but deposited in the checking account in January 2022). These contributions offset approximately one-third of the 2021 expenditures (\$30,738.02) for the Centennial Celebration. For the second consecutive year the Society had a major

reduction in expenses due to the National Convention being held virtually instead of at the American Pharmacists Association's Annual Meeting & Exposition.

The Society's finances support a solid financial foundation for the future. The Committee views the following items to be important for future budgeting and financial projections.

- The new membership dues of \$100 will provide the Society with a reliable increase in operating revenue, though this may be tempered by a decline in new memberships due to decline in pharmacy school enrollments.
- The establishment of Rho Chi as a 501(3)(c) corporation has the potential to significantly increase the Society's revenue from contributions.
- The Society has created a process where the national office no longer handles most Rho Chi Merchandise while also creating a stream of income through royalties.
- As the Society returns to in person events, the projected costs for such events will need to be planned and budgeted.
- The Society has invested its reserve funds in two accounts with Midwest Trust Company, which creates the opportunity for increased income and growth in assets. The Committee commends this decision but is interested in knowing how investment decisions are made. While the National Bylaws assign responsibility for monitoring and reporting of investment funds to the Treasurer and Executive Vice President, they do not specifically state the party(ies) responsible for making investment decisions. We think that the creation of a Finance and/or Investment Committee may be wise.

On behalf of the Committee's members, thank you for the opportunity to serve Rho Chi in this capacity.

Report of the National Office 2022 98th Annual National Convention March 12, 2022

The National Office of the Rho Chi Society has had a productive year, and we have focused many of our activities on our upcoming Centennial celebration. Please note that our founding date was May 19, 1922. The following report details some of our activities for the past year.

1. The Rho Chi Society 100th Celebration has begun!

Highlights from the National Office

- In January and February 2022, every chapter received Centennial celebratory gifts for student and alumni members that they requested to use in their 2022 activities. Gifts included 100th pins, pens, lanyards, stickers and one set of PX letters.
- Our 3 founding chapters (Alpha, Beta, Gamma) worked with the National Office to create a video about the importance of the Rho Chi Society. See rhochi.org!
- We are hosting a COAST TO COAST CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION ON MARCH 20TH
 - o In-person at the APhA annual meeting on March 20, 2022 at 4:30pm CST in the Grand Hyatt Lonestar Ballroom D/E.
 - Virtually register to experience our Centennial Celebration Video on March 20, 2022 at 6pm EST. The video will highlight the history of Rho Chi, messages from our pharmacy leaders of the Society, and the timeline of our 132 chapters chartered throughout the past 100 years!.
- We will host an in-person reception at the AACP annual meeting in July 2022.
- We developed Centennial Donation Packages, ranging from \$25 to \$2500. See https://rhochi.org/donate/ and launched a donation campaign in November 2021.
- We hired an individual to help us write a historical update from 1994 to present, The Rho Chi Society booklet was last published in 1994.

2. Virtual Meetings

The past year remained an online interactive environment due to the COVID pandemic. We conducted virtual, quarterly executive council meetings. We successfully hosted our first virtual Rho Chi annual meeting for our National Convention on March 6, 2021. [Thank you Cindy Diakow!]

The annual business meeting for the Society will remain virtual so that all chapters are able to attend, and it will be held prior to the APhA annual meeting. Currently, we intend to use in-person time for a reception at the APhA annual meeting for networking of Rho Chi members and celebration of awards winners. We likely need to reconsider how and where to host in-person events.

We supported the first national Rho Chi Town Hall in April 2021. Upcoming Chapter Development Town Hall is April 19, 2022.

3. Rho Chi Society and chapter 501c3 status

The National Office supported the transition of chapters to 501c3 status, and we have 64 chapters with their status reported, and we know many are awaiting IRS responses. Chapters with revenue exceeding \$5000 incurred financial costs, and the National

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Office will reimburse chapters for the cost of filing a 1023EZ form for \$275. If your chapter has not managed this issue yet, we will work with you over the next few months to finalize your 501c3 status.

4. Financial status of the Society

The financial viability of The Rho Chi Society is positive, and our new National Treasurer will report on our account balances.

The change in our tax status to 501c3 in August 2020 provided an opportunity for us to grow our financial investments to support our Centennial celebrations as well as grow our scholarship and award programs through donations. Our email campaign to friends of the Society and to LinkedIn resulted in over \$8000 in contributions. We intend to grow this aspect of our work in the future, after Centennial and with new strategic planning.

5. Social Media

Our Rho Chi Society social media groups are growing. We encourage sharing your chapter content on your pages, tagging Rho Chi, sharing on our Rho Chi group pages, and following other chapters.

6. Growth

We have 132 active chapters and 140 chartered chapters historically, with 6 new chapters pending election results.

7. Announcements

 - Our virtual Centennial celebration will premiere at 6pm EST. You may register online by visiting our Meetings page on rhochi.org. The video will be available to view afterward.
- We have posted our Centennial logo and powerpoint template online for you to use for your initiation ceremonies and Centennial celebrations! Click on Toolkit under the Resources tab at rhochi.org.
- Centennial webpage is now available. Check out our history and videos from past leaders.
- Purchase Rho Chi merchandise from rhochi.org/merchandise.
- You can donate online and receive our Limited Edition Centennial Pin! Make a donation at rhochi.org/donate.
- Chapter Development Rho Chi Town Hall is April 19, 4pm Pacific/7pm Eastern.
- The National Office is requesting a copy of your **Chapter bylaws** for our records. Please submit if you have not.
- **Annual chapter reports** are required from each chapter through the form on our website. Submit by May 15th for award consideration and by June 15th deadline otherwise.
- **REPEATING...** Rho Chi chapter record keeping. It is vital for chapters to retain all documents and pass them down year to year. When advisors leave, these records should stay with the chapter. These are all important records to track your alumni and guide your future chapter leaders. Items to keep on file include:
 - Chapter bylaws and procedures,
 - o 501c3 status documentation from university and/or chapter,
 - o Chapter meeting minutes,
 - o Annual chapter membership election reports submitted to National Office,
 - Annual chapter reports submitted to National Office which contains a list of your chapter officers
 - Annual list of members; we now recommend that you ask members to provide a personal email for future alumni contact as one's university/school email may be deactivated, and
 - Records of payments from members and dues payments to the Rho Chi Society.

Report of the Credentials Committee 2022

Quorum was met for number of chapter delegates registered that casted a vote in the Rho Chi Society for the March 2022 Elections.

<u>SUMMARY</u>

108 chapters registered a chapter delegate, but 4 chapters registered and did not complete the vote and will be marked absent. 24 chapters did not register a chapter delegate and will be marked absent. Therefore, 28 chapters were marked absent for the 2022 Rho Chi Society National Convention.

- 132 active chapters for 2022 elections.
- 104 chapters registered a delegate and completed the ballot.

Dr. Nappi is dedicated to her clinical practice in cardiology with expertise in heart failure at the Medical University of South Carolina where she collaborates interprofessionally to care for inpatients and those in the Congestive Heart Failure Clinic. She is a multiple recipient of the MUSC Clinical Services Recognition Award and has received the ACCP Clinical Practice Award.

As a passionate educator, Dr. Nappi has an extraordinary devotion to teaching. She has received the ACCP Education Award and the ACCP Robert K. Chalmers Distinguished Pharmacy Educator Award. She served as Director of the Pharmacy Residency Program for 5 years and as the Director of MUSC's Pharmacotherapy Residency Program for 10 years. She pioneered the Academic Preparation Program which prepares pharmacy residents to works as educators throughout the residency programs in South Carolina. Her mentorship of pharmacy students and residents who have become educators and scholars leaves a lasting legacy in pharmacy practice.

- o Councilors review and score all reports not previously scored by that Councilor in Round 2.
- Top scoring report is selected as the Chapter Achievement Award Winner.

The Most Improved Chapter Award material distribution, review, and winner selection occurs in conjunction with the Chapter Achievement Award.
