# The Rho Chi Society's 99<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting Report of the National President February 22, 2023

It is truly my pleasure to provide a summary of the Society's achievements since the 2022 virtual National Convention. This past year marked a milestone for the Rho Society with a series of monumental events, activities, and initiatives. The most memorable and celebrated revolved around the Society's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary which began with a tremendously successful and joyous Centennial Celebration in March. The momentum of the past 100 years carried forward with many achievements, updates, and opportunities for member engagement as outlined:

- The Society welcomed Julie Seeger as its new Program Manager. Julie has been actively
  involved in taking over the reins from Cindy Diakow who will be pursuing new and
  exciting endeavors. I would like to express my sincerest gratitude and appreciation for
  Cindy's unwavering dedication to the Society and its efforts. Her presence will be missed
  but her indelible mark with will remain for years to come.
- A new medallion design was reviewed and evaluated this past year. After much deliberation, a traditional solid purple ribbon and antique medallion with the new logo were selected and will be available for purchase by Rho Chi members via the Award Concepts store once the legacy medallion inventory runs out this Spring.
- In light of the success with virtual business meetings over the past few years, a decision was made to conduct the business components of the Annual Convention virtually and acknowledge the Lecture Award recipient with a remote presentation moving forward.
- Given the current financial landscape, Treasurer Brad Boucher recommended evaluating
  the possibility of reallocating funds to account for market changes. The Executive
  Council reviewed potential options and voted to reallocate short and long-term
  investments in collaboration with MidWest Trust to \$67,563 for Short Term (as of
  9/19/22) and \$532,725 for Long Term (as of 9/19/22).
- The Communications Task Force led by Regional Councilor Amanda Stahnke proposed the formation of a new Communications Committee and provided associated descriptive language for review. Bylaw changes were presented to and accepted by the Executive Council with minor revisions. The Communications Committee proposal with associated language has moved forward for a vote by members during the 2023 Annual Meeting.
- 2023 is the last year of the current Strategic Plan. Arrangements for developing the Society's 2024-2028 Strategic Plan have begun. David Zgarrick will be leading the strategic planning process with an introductory meeting in spring 2023 and comprehensive planning seminar prior to the AACP Annual Meeting in July 2023.
- The Executive Council discussed and continues to evaluate annual reception and networking opportunities for alumni engagement. Consideration is being made for

- collaborating with other organizations and rotating venues to expand interactions with alumni.
- Executive Vice President Karen Farris from the National Office identified and presented proposals for multiple bylaw revisions and updates including defining attendance at National Convention (Article IV), changing election process from written ballot (Article V), adding Communications as standing committee (Articles VI and VII), and updating language about Credentials Committee for alternative voting processes. These items will be voted on during the Annual Convention.
- The Town Hall Task Force led by Immediate Past President Emmanuelle Schwartzman held its second Town Hall which involved a Chapter Development Webinar. Chapter Achievement and Project Proposal Award winners from three institutions (Alpha Nu University of Tennessee, Alpha Xi University of Kentucky, Beta Tau Northeastern University) shared noteworthy practices and ideas associated with innovative activities at their chapters. This helped chapters imagine and execute new activities that aligned with chapter and community needs. In addition to the webinar, the task force evaluated potential topics, structures, and timing for future events. It was decided that one town hall will be conducted annually with the next program to occur in fall 2023. The topic will focus on Fellowship and Residency planning and preparation.
- The Awards Task Force led by President-Elect Andy Smith developed the "Most Improved Chapter Procedures 2022" to clarify eligibility criteria that must be met for the Most Improved Award. The procedures include evaluating all eligible chapters regardless of region, listing a forced rank as the preferred method for evaluation, and providing some additional considerations for ranking. The task force also reviewed the overall Chapter Achievement Award rubric and added context in various sections to assist chapters in completing detailed reports and provide Regional Councilors with more guidance during their evaluation process.

In addition to the Society's standing committees and task forces, whose charges are outlined in our bylaws, two new task forces were appointed in late 2022 to conduct their work in 2023.

- The Student Executive Council Task Force led by Lindsay Brust-Sisti (Alumni) and Lucio Volino (President) is charged with evaluating other pharmacy organizations' student leadership missions and structures. The group will then look at the potential role and structure of a Rho Chi Student Executive Council. This Task Force's critical work will serve as the foundation for how the Society engages its members to further develop and support pharmacy's intellectual leaders.
- The Alumni Task Force led by Lori Duke (Region III-S Councilor) and Fatima Amjad
  (Alumni) will identify methods for bridging the gap from member induction through
  career placement while enhancing interactions with alumni members. The Alumni Task
  Force is charged with engaging Rho Chi alumni, aligning initiatives with communicationbased activities, and evaluating the need for an Alumni Committee moving forward. I

believe that this will be a phenomenal opportunity to strengthen our membership base and its connection to the National Office.

Your hard work, dedication, and resilience drive the Society forward. Without you, none of this could be possible. RE: Report of Audit of 2022 Rho Chi Financial Records

Dear National Office,

The Rho Chi Audit Committee consisting of Susan Skledar (Chair), John Bentley, and Jeffrey Sherer, was charged to review the 2022 financial records of the Society. Julie Seeger, Program Manager, provided the Society's Financial Records to the Committee's members.

The Committee finds all financial records to be in good order and noted only the following discrepancies on the Treasurer's Report.

• The Centennial expenses are noted as \$39,469.54 on the Treasurer's report. In the Financial Summary pie charts, this expense is noted as \$36,696, which does not include the Centennial Gift Box Shopping (\$2773.80). In addition, \$3,802 is noted on the Financial Summary pie chart as an expense for "Meetings," but is included in \$137,555 total for the National Office Expenses on the Treasurer's Report (travel expenses of \$3801.92); thus, it is being double-counted on the expenses pie chart.

From the statements provided, the end of year market value of the Midwest Trust Short and Long-Term Investment Accounts are properly recorded and there are no discrepancies. The \$120,000 transferred into the Trusts (\$20,000 from BOAA Savings/Checking #3809 to short-term investments; \$20,000 from BOAA Savings/Checking #3809 to long-term investments; and \$80,000 from BOAA Checking #3276 to long-term investments) described in the Banking Summary, is accounted for in the Midwest Trust account summaries, and is noted on the Treasurer's final report.

The Committee notes that revenue in the form of donations in the amount of \$8,874.12 was received in 2022, and this is properly accounted for. The breakdown of overall revenue/income and expense for CY 2022 is national dues (69%; \$202,433.91) and insignia (certificates/jewelry; 20%; \$60,467). The major expenses are for the National Office (57%; \$137,555.48) and the Centennial Celebration (16%; \$39,470). This breakdown is similar for CY2021 and CY2022, with the following differences in income/revenue between the two years:

- Less income from new member dues/new chapters/insignia in CY2022 (\$29,602.60)
- Less income from royalties (online product sales/spirit recognition/honor cords) in CY2022 (\$15,911.50)
- Increased expense for AFPE first-year graduate scholarship (\$3000)
- Increase expenses for National Office salaries (\$10,371.01)

Overall, operating income exceeded annual expenses by \$54,634.96, which is a roughly a 58% reduction in net revenue from CY2021 (i.e., revenue in excess of expenses). That being said, the Society's finances continue to support a solid foundation for the future. The Committee views the following items as important for future budgeting and financial projections:

- The new membership dues/insignia continue to be the primary revenue stream. As noted last year, this will continue to decline as pharmacy school enrollments decline.
- Revenue/income from donations and from royalties particularly honor cords, will continue to be a benefit to Rho Chi.
  - o The National Society should consider a campaign to Rho Chi alumni donors to secure donations beyond the Centennial year.
- Continuing the national and regional meetings on the virtual platform continues to be costeffective.
- The budget forecast for CY2023 is that operating income will approximately equal operating expenses, which is a reasonable assumption in the current environment. At this time, the budget forecast assumes no donations for CY2023.
- The \$20,000 allocated in the budget forecast for CY2023 for the AACP Strategic Planning Meeting is necessary, especially as the ACPE Standards will be changing soon.
- The Midwest Trust Company continues to create the opportunity for increased income and growth in assets. Although CY2023 was a challenging year with respect to the performance of the market, this is not expected in the long-term. Transferring \$120,000 to these accounts was a wise decision in the face of decreasing revenue and increasing expenses for the Society.

The Committee recommends for subsequent years that the Treasurer's Report and the Banking Summary continue to be included as the base documents for comparison for this audit. We also recommend that the "Income/Expense Comparison by Category," containing values for the current year and previous year, continue to be included in the base documents made available to the Audit Committee.

On behalf of the Committee's members, we thank you for the opportunity to serve Rho Chi in this capacity.

Calendar year 2022 was a stable year financially for the Rho Chi Society. A summary of these events is outlined below.

- Utilization of the Rho Chi Society Investment Policy for Short and Long-Term investment for the first full year that were created and approved in 2021.
- The Centennial Donation Campaign donations totaled \$8,874.12 that were used to help offset the Centennial Celebration expenses of \$39,469.54.
   Donations raised in 2021 totaling \$8,028.61 were also used to help offset the event expense.
- Operating revenue exceeding expenses by \$54,634.96. Of particular significance from the revenue and expense report were \$20,231.50 in revenue from royalties for Rho Chi Merchandise sold by external vendors and \$10,105.25 and an additional \$1,636.55 from national Rho Chi Society headquarter sales. For the third consecutive year the Society had a major reduction in expenses due to the National Convention being held virtually instead of at the American Pharmacists Association's Annual Meeting & Exposition.
- Midwest Trust Company continued to manage the Rho Chi Society investments in compliance with the Rho Chi Investment Policy. As of December 31, 2022, the Short-Term Investment Fund assets value was \$67,708.97 and the Long-Term Investments Fund assets value was \$533,190. Noteworthy was the transfer of \$20,000 from cash reserves to the Short-Term Investment Fund and \$100,000 to the Long-Term Investment Fund in 2022.
- Successful audit of the 2022 Rho Chi Society financial records by the Rho Chi Audit Committee in their letter dated January 20, 2023.

#### 3. 2022-23 Priorities

- Manage agenda, technology, and voting for National Convention
- Finalize documentation of 501c3 nonprofit status for all chapters
- Hosted the Rho Chi Town Hall on April 19, 2022, focusing on chapter development, with presentations from leaders of our award-winning chapter
- Evaluate our strategic plan and develop a new plan for 2023 2028 in summer 2023

#### 4. Centennial Celebrations were the focus of 2022

- Provided Centennial celebration gifts to every chapter in early 2022
- Hosted successful Centennial Celebration reception in March at APhA 2022, with ~200 attendees including alumni, students, and faculty
- Created Centennial webpage to capture history and Past Presidents' video messages. https://rhochi.org/centennial/
- Created Centennial video to capture the history of the Society, with celebratory messages from Rho Chi past presidents, as well as messages from the three founding chapters. To view, visit: https://youtu.be/je4440h-lik
- Commissioned update of our historical booklet, *The Rho Chi Society*, that is undergoing editing at this time.

## 5. Website Update on rhochi.org

Rho Chi has added an interactive Chapter Map to our website to allow easy collaboration between chapters. Explore the new map to see all active chapter information, officers, and

social media profiles of each chapter. Please update your chapter information through an Advisor login.

### 6. Social Media

Our Rho Chi Society social media groups continue to grow. We anticipate that our SM presence will increase as we develop the activities for what we hope is a new standing Communications Committee (bylaw change on 2023 ballot). We encourage sharing your chapter content on your chapter social media pages, tagging Rho Chi, sharing on our Rho Chi national group pages, and following other chapters. #rhochiforlife

## 7. Update on Financials

The financial viability of The Rho Chi Society is positive, and the Treasurer and Audit reports attest to this status. The EVP works with the Treasurer and Executive Council to determine what financial resources should be reinvested in the Society. The upcoming strategic plan will provide guidance on using our investments and donation campaign funds.

## 8. Virtual conventions and future in-person gatherings

We will continue to host our National Convention virtually. We intend to host in-person receptions at various professional meetings.

#### 9. PLS Collaboration

We have begun to explore collaborations with Phi Lambda Sigma at annual meetings to host networking receptions beginning in 2024, either for our members and/or advisors.

## 10. Proposed bylaw changes

We managed the development and voting of four potential bylaw changes, and these results will be announced after the ballot is tabulated. The bylaw changes include

- 1. Defining attendance at National Convention (Article IV),
- 2. Changing election process from written ballot (Article V),
- 3. Adding Communications as standing committee (Articles VI and VII), and
- 4. Updating language about Credentials Committee for alternative voting processes (Article XI).

Chapters are encouraged to join others across the country to attend this inspiring lecture.

The work for the 2024 Lecture Award is progressing as the call for nominations occurred in the fall semester of 2022. Rho Chi Chapters received monthly e-mails during the fall semester requesting nominations for the 2024 Rho Chi Lecture Award. The initial e-mail provided an outline of the process and links to the Rho Chi website for submission. The Rho Chi National Office posted Lecture Award announcements on social media outlets. Communications targeted Rho Chi Chapters, Chapter Presidents, Advisors and College of Pharmacy Deans.

The Lecture Award Committee appointed for the 2024 Lecture Award includes Dr. Harold Mann 2021 Rho Chi Lecture Award Recipient, Dr. Jean Nappi 2022 Rho Chi Lecture Award Recipient, Dr. Jack Reynolds, Past President of the Rho Chi Society and Dr. Cynthia Phillips Rho Chi National Historian. In her role as National Historian, Dr. Cynthia Phillips serves as Ex-Officio Committee Chair

Committee members received eleven dossiers for review. Seven nominations from the previous cycle were moved forward for consideration, with one updated and four new nominations were received for 2024. ## **Review of Charges**

According to the National Bylaws of The Rho Chi Society, the Awards Committee is charged with "selecting recipients for the Rho Chi Chapter Achievement and Rho Chi Chapter Project Proposal Awards".

### **Activities**

The Awards Committee reviewed Chapter Reports and Project Proposal Award submissions throughout the year. Councilors conducted most of their work remotely and submitted evaluations electronically.

A virtual orientation was held in July 2022 with a presentation reviewing committee responsibilities, timelines, and evaluation materials. An interactive mock report and evaluation form review session was held after the presentation. Scoring rubric feedback was collected and discussed.

## **Chapter Achievement Award Review Process Overview\***

#### Round 1

- o Councilors review and score reports from another region.
- o Top two chapters from each region (total of 22) move on to the next round.
- This year 24 chapters moved on to the second round due to ties in the two regions

## Round 2 (Top 10 Selection)

- Each Councilor reviews and scores 10-12 new reports for round two.
- Each report is scored by at least 5 councilors
- The top 10 ranked reports based on average scores move to Round 3.

#### Round 3 (Winner Selection)

- Councilors review and score all reports not previously scored by that Councilor in Round
   2.
- Top scoring report is selected as the Chapter Achievement Award Winner.

<sup>\*</sup>Note: Report scores are averaged in each round to determine rank, progression to the next round, and winner.

The Most Improved Chapter Award material distribution, review, and winner selection occurs in conjunction with the Chapter Achievement Award. Historically, only one chapter per region moved on to the second round in this award. The award taskforce determined that the most improved award will not be judged in regions, all chapters submitting for the award will be evaluated equally. This year there was only ten eligible entries, so ranking started with Round 2.

## Most Improved Chapter Award Review Process Overview\*\*

Round 1 (Top 10 Chapter Selection)

o This round was not required this year (only ten eligible entries).

Round 2 (Top Chapters Ranking and Selection)

- Councilors review and rank top region reports.
- o Top 3 chapters reports are selected for final review.

Round 3 (Winner Selection)

- o Councilors review and vote on the top chapter.
- o Top voted report selected as the Most Improved Chapter Award Winner.

\*\*Note: Report scores are averaged in each round to determine rank and progression to the next round. Movement into the final round is based on the number of top rankings. The final round is a vote for the top chapter (only one vote per councilor, the chair serves as tie breaker if needed).

## **Chapter Report and Project Proposal Award Review Summary 2021-2022**

## Chapter Report Submission

- 2022: 130 Chapters submitted a report for their work conducted in 2021-2022.
- 64 Chapters did not submit a report by May 15 for award consideration.
- All active Chapters submitted a report.

#### **Chapter Achievement Award**

- 47 Chapters met eligibility for the Chapter Achievement Award.
- 19 Chapters submitted on time but did not meet all required eligibility criteria.
- Reports were distributed to the Committee for review on July 15th, 2022.
- Councilors reviewed and scored chapter reports for the Chapter Achievement Award Round 1 review by August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022.
- Top 24 chapters were selected as Round 1 Finalists and sent to the Committee for Round 2 review and scoring on October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022 with evaluations due by November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2022.
- Top 10 chapters were selected as Round 2 Finalists and sent to the Committee for Round 3 review and scoring on November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022 with evaluations due by January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
- Top scoring chapter was selected for the Chapter Achievement Award in January 2023 and will be announced at the Rho Chi Virtual Annual Meeting on March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

#### **Most Improved Chapter Award**

- 18 Chapters indicated an interest in being considered for the Most Improved Chapter Award, but 8 chapters were not eligible.
- A total of 10 Chapters were eligible and reviewed for the Most Improved Chapter Award.
- Reviewed started in conjunction with Round 2 of the Chapter Achievement Award.
- Councilors were instructed to rank the ten chapters. Materials were provided October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022 with evaluations due by November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

- After averaging the rankings, the top 3 Chapters were shared with the Committee in January and the committee was asked to vote on the top chapter by January 30<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
- Top ranked chapter was selected for the Most Improved Chapter Award in January 2023 and will be announced at the Rho Chi Virtual Annual Meeting on March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
