

Thinking Like a Poker Player: How Rho Chi Members Can Sharpen Critical Thinking and Lead with Confidence

In *Thinking in Bets*, author and former professional poker player Annie Duke challenges us to rethink how we approach decisions, uncertainty, and leadership. Her central premise—that good decisions are not always defined by good outcomes—aligns powerfully with Rho Chi's commitment to critical inquiry and intellectual leadership.

As pharmacy leaders, we are often asked to make decisions with incomplete information. Whether interpreting clinical data, developing a treatment plan, or leading an organizational initiative, uncertainty is inevitable. Duke encourages us to replace rigid certainty with *probabilistic thinking*—a mindset that values nuance, evaluates likelihoods, and stays open to revising beliefs when new evidence emerges. This is exactly the kind of intellectual agility that defines Rho Chi's vision of leadership.

A powerful example from Duke's poker career illustrates this well. Imagine you're holding a strong hand—say, a pair of aces—and based on your opponents' betting patterns and probabilities, you decide to go all-in. Statistically, you're a heavy favorite to win. But then the final card (the "river") gives your opponent an unlikely straight, and you lose. The *outcome* was bad, but the *decision*—based on all available information—was excellent. This separation between decision quality and result is crucial for pharmacy professionals who must often act amid clinical uncertainty.

Duke also introduces a simple but powerful way to challenge your own thinking: "You wanna bet?" This question forces us to examine how confident we are in our assumptions. In the Rho Chi spirit of intellectual leadership, this approach encourages thoughtful reflection, humility, and openness to feedback.

Equally important is Duke's concept of a "truth-seeking pod"—a small, trusted group of peers who help you analyze decisions, spot blind spots, and refine your reasoning. For Rho Chi members, this mirrors the collaborative energy of our chapters, where dialogue, peer learning, and mentoring are key. These pods promote intellectual humility, accountability, and continuous improvement—hallmarks of leadership in pharmacy and beyond.

By adopting the principles in *Thinking in Bets*, Rho Chi members can enhance their ability to lead with clarity, curiosity, and confidence amid uncertainty. It's not about knowing all the answers—it's about making thoughtful bets, learning from the outcomes, and continuously refining our thinking. That's the kind of leadership our profession needs.
